3D Online Symposium: Exploring Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Healthcare

Intended Learning Outcomes

Aim: The aim of this session is to provide the Year 1 medical students an insight into the diverse array of health inequalities that affect the people from Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities in the UK. This includes understanding how cultural perspectives can interact with health, the need for healthcare workers to be aware of the impact of bias, and an understanding of work taking place in the community to address these inequalities.

Whilst the communities affected by these inequalities are often referred to as Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (or BAME) in healthcare research, we will be specifically looking at how disparities in healthcare outcomes are linked to the ideas of race and ethnicity, and in addition the role that racism can play in this.

The purpose of this day is not to explore every form of health inequality or service inequity. Content exploring these topics is threaded throughout your curriculum in topic specific teaching throughout your 5 years in medicine (e.g. Cardiovascular, Obs and Gynae) as part of our work to decolonise the medical curriculum. This day is designed for you to hear the lived experience of experts and patients from these communities, to consider how culture and racism interact with health, to understand some of the work taking place within these communities and to consider your role as a doctor and ally.

Intended Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students will explore examples of the disparities in health and healthcare linked to race and ethnicity, through experts in the field, individual lived experience and narratives delivered by community organisations
- 2. Students will understand how barriers to healthcare services can be connected to a person's cultural and ethnic background
- **3.** Students will reflect on their own unconscious bias towards people from different cultural and ethnic backgrounds to their own, and how these are linked to people's experience of racism
- 4. Student will reflect on how their own, and other people's, bias can perpetuate and sustain health inequalities
- 5. Students will reflect on their role as an ally to the colleagues, patients and communities who experience racism, health inequalities and healthcare inequity, and how as a doctor they can address health inequality in their everyday practice
